

School Checklist

To create a better future for our children, it is essential that schools and school districts have faith-friendly policies and practices. We envision public schools as places where students feel the freedom to express their faith and where they gain an academic appreciation for the Bible and Christianity across the whole curriculum as they relate to history, culture, and values. This can be done legally and appropriately within existing constitutional boundaries and in keeping with current laws and state standards.

What Can I Do?

The School Checklist (on the reverse side of this page) answers the question: "What should I do?" The checklist becomes a simple way to review your schools and, if necessary, advocate for improvements. It focuses on two areas:

- 1) **Religious freedom** schools must be safe places for religious expression
- 2) **Academic freedom** teachers must feel free to teach about the influence of the Bible and Christianity as they relate to history, culture, and values

Evaluate two things in your schools:

- POLICIES School policies need to promote and protect freedom of religious expression and academic freedom to address topics related to religion
- PRACTICES Classroom practices need to foster freedom of religious expression and instruction about the cultural and historical influence of the Bible and Christianity.
